 Both male and female elephants possess tusks. They use them for digging, foraging and fighting. Elephants are poached for their tusks. Their tusks are made of ivory which is very valuable. They have very large ears that they flap to cool down their body temperature.

 African elephants are the world's biggest land mammal. Their pregnancies are the longest of any mammal, a full 22 months. Their scientific name is *Loxodonta*.

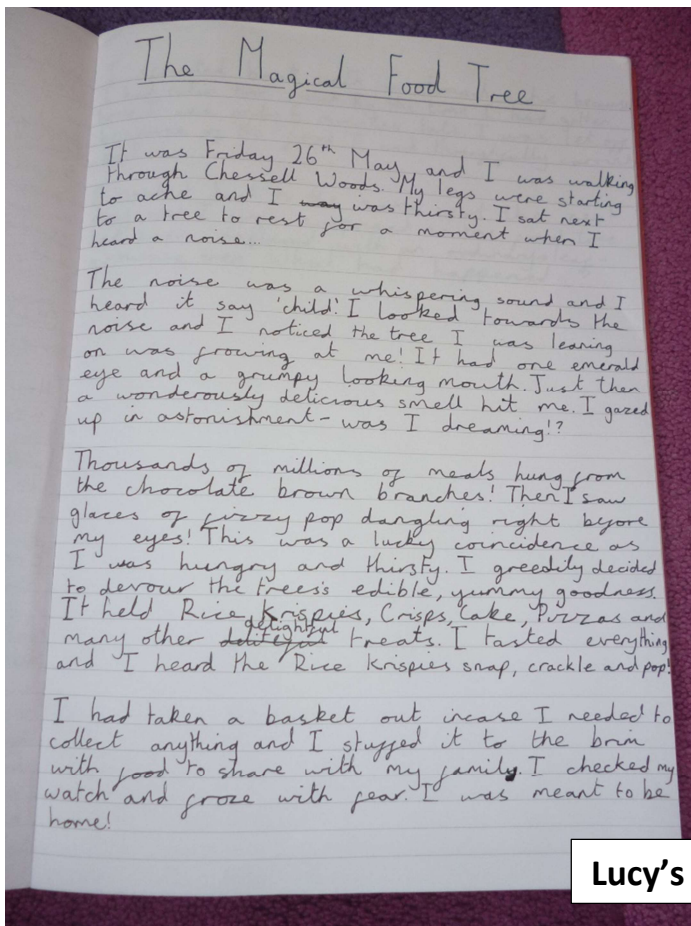


Bella's been on a nature walk and look at her super Viking facts – great drawing and beautifully presented.

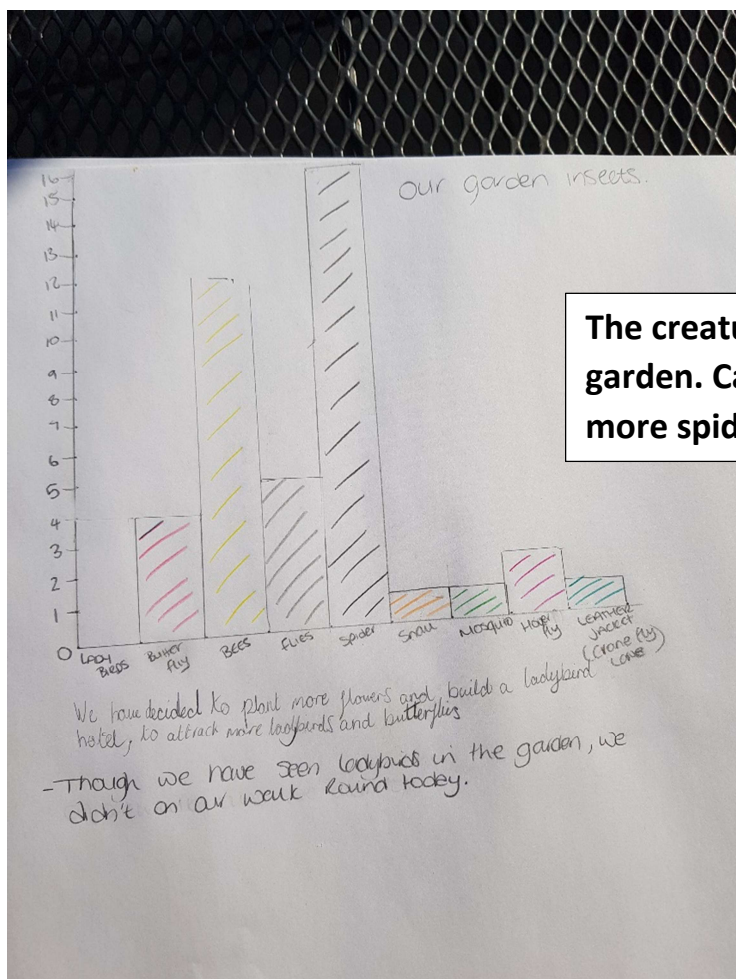
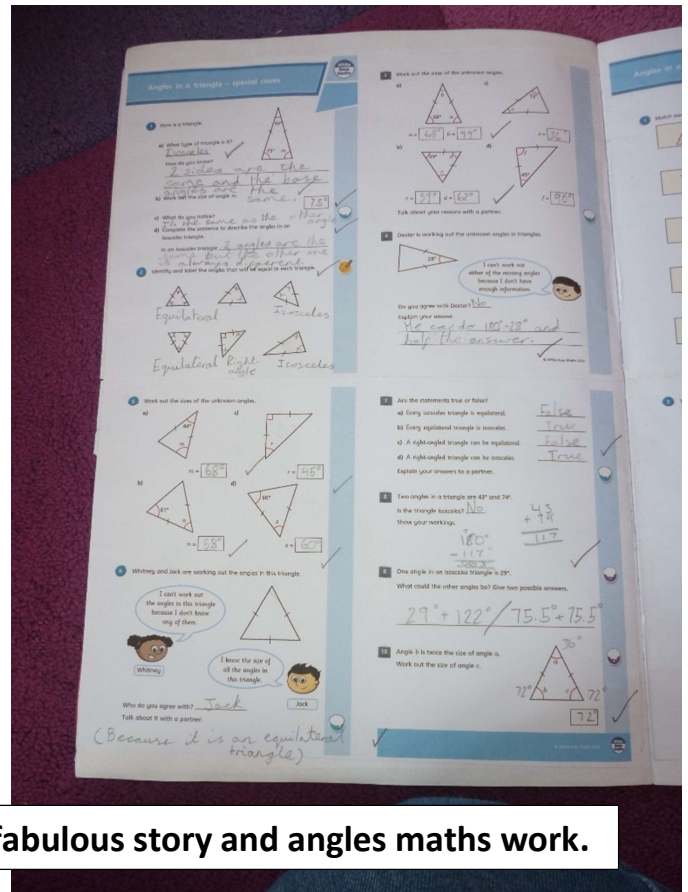


Alfie hard at work finding out about the Vikings. Great drawing of the Viking ship Alfie.

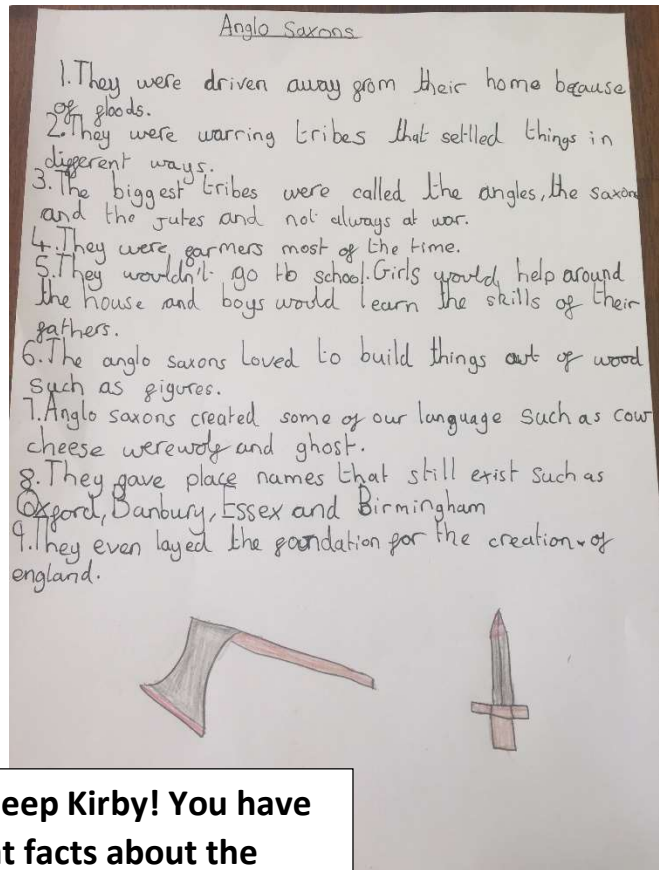




Lucy's fabulous story and angles maths work.
