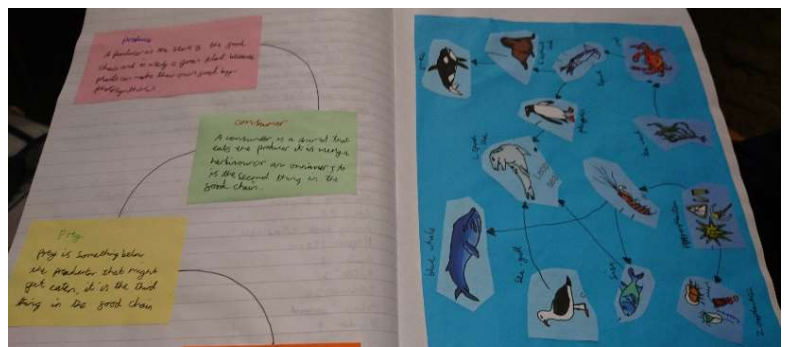

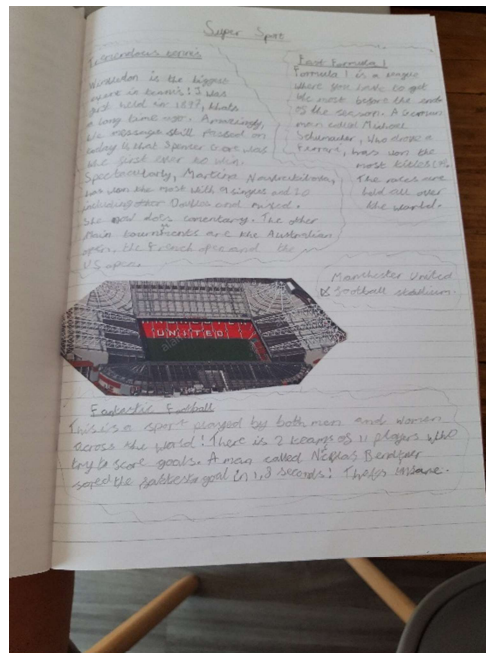
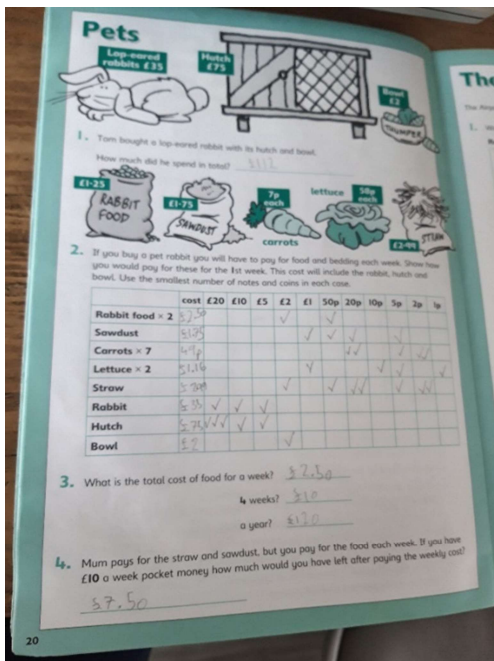
The Wildlife Trust for Beds, Cambs & Northants

Most people think it is ok to keep some animals in a zoo if they are endangered or are very rare, however it is cruel to take an animal from its pod or family.



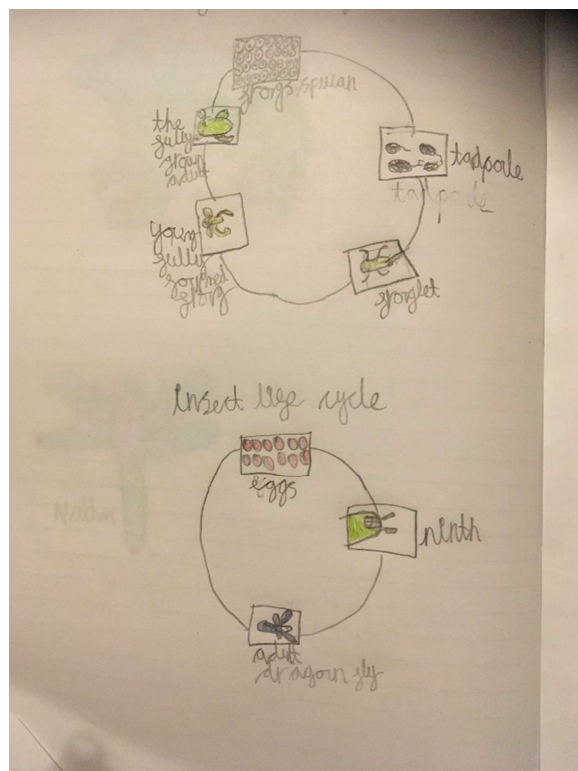

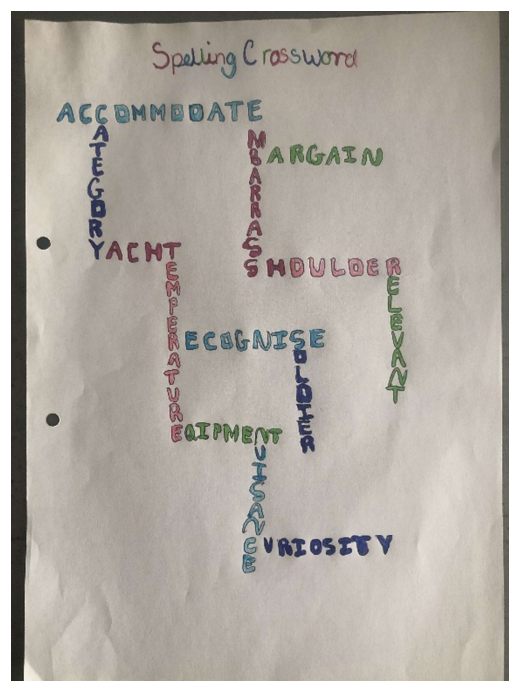
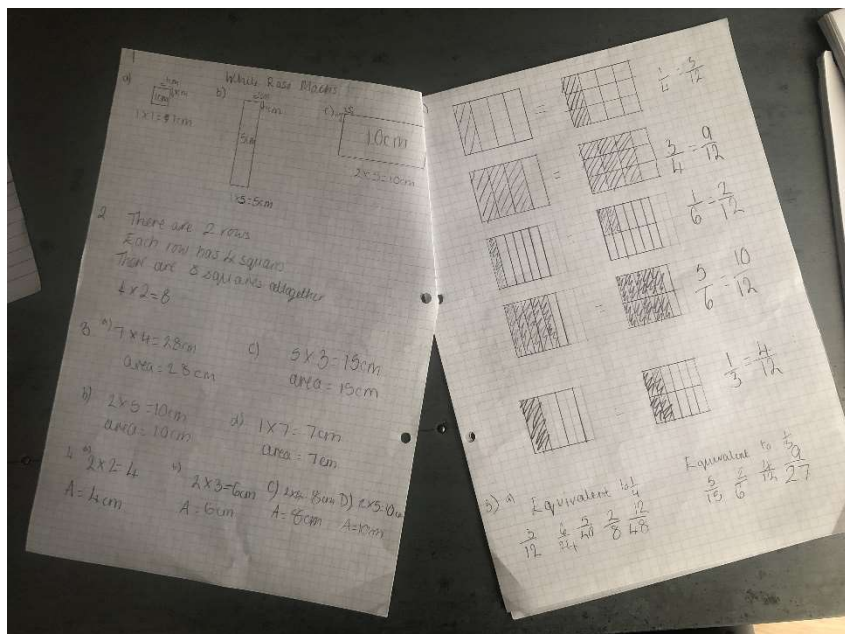


Nathan has been busy, I have received lots of photos of maths, reading comprehensions, science and writing. Well done Nathan.
